Lawall employs only well-trained and highly-skilled practitioners certified by the American Board for Certification in Orthotics and Prosthetics (ABC) and licensed within the states where they practice. An ABC certification assures that the practitioner has met the profession's most rigorous standards through intensive training, including undergraduate and post graduate education, apprenticeships or residency programs, and passing a three-part comprehensive examination. Credentials must be renewed every five years and practitioners must complete a mandated number of continuing education credits to maintain competency.

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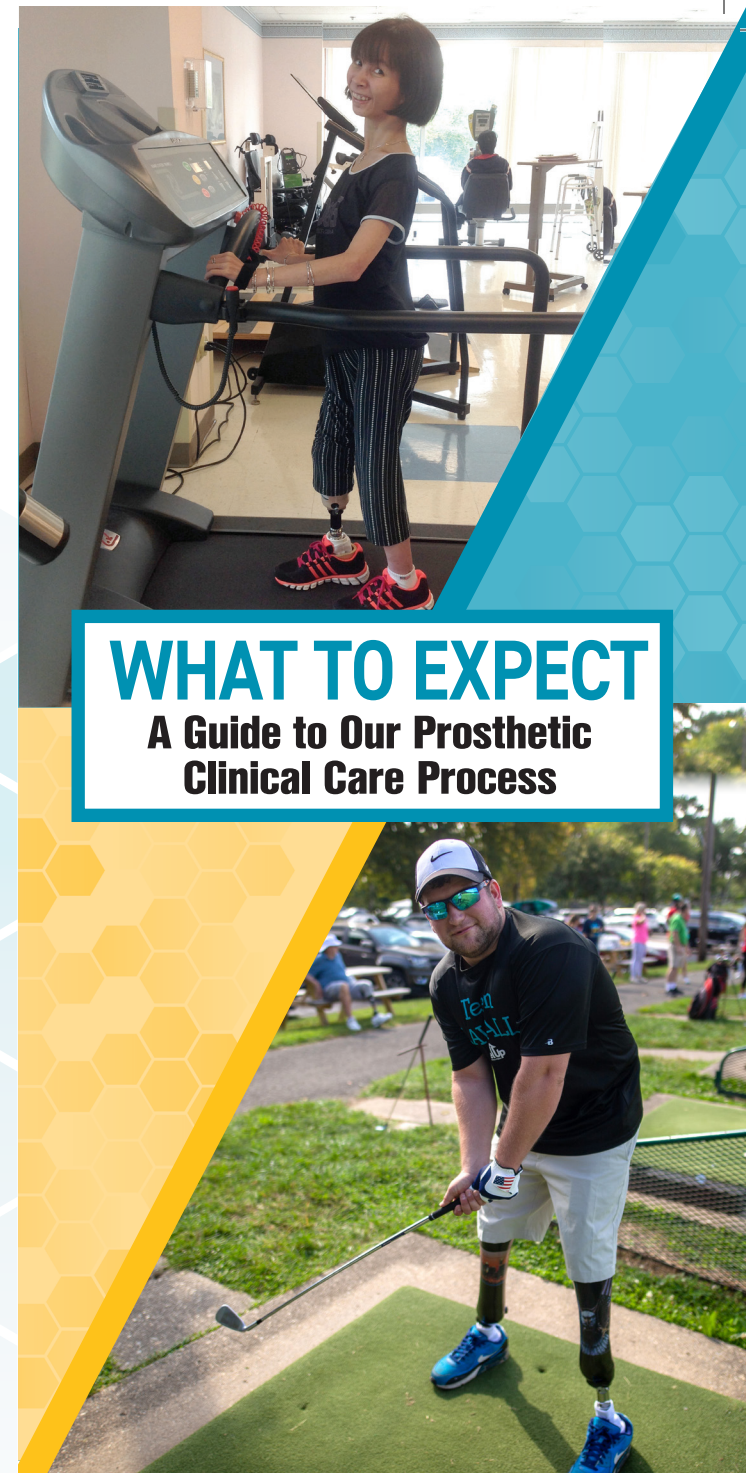

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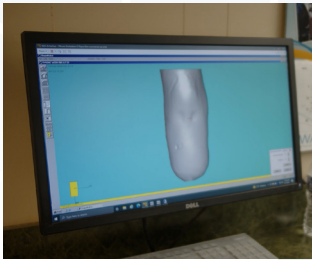
WHAT TO EXPECT
A Guide to Our Prosthetic
Clinical Care Process

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PRE-PROSTHETIC PREPARATION

Depending on the care plan established by the team, your pre-prosthetic training will likely involve skin care, muscle strengthening, pain management (desensitizing your residual limb and scar tissue), and limb shaping. In most cases, your prosthetist will employ the use of a shrinker or compression sock to control the swelling.

Follow up visits with your physician to check healing progress will take place during this time and pre-prosthesis fitting concerns will be addressed. Once your limb is well-healed and much of the initial swelling has gone down, your physician will release you for a prosthesis and your prosthetist will begin the process of building your socket. There are a variety of ways to create a socket, and your clinician will share with you how he/she achieves the best fit.



YOUR INITIAL VISIT

During your initial visit one of our prosthetists will give you an overview of Lawall's clinical care process and explain the importance of the patient/practitioner partnership.

In addition, a new patient form will be completed and reviewed so that Lawall will be able to start a patient chart to have a record of your care moving forward. You will also be asked to provide your insurance information in order to set up your patient account.

Once these preliminary steps have been completed, a patient evaluation will be made by one of our prosthetists. During this evaluation, the prosthetist will ask you questions about your occupation, lifestyle, interests, activity level, and goals for your treatment. You will also be given the chance to ask questions. The interview and evaluation will assist us in developing a treatment plan and designing a prosthetic device that best meets your specific needs, so please provide as much information as possible.

Lastly, the prosthetist will scan, measure and/or cast your limb to provide the prosthesis that was prescribed for you. In many instances, you will initially be fit with a clear diagnostic test socket. This is used to allow your prosthetist to make adjustments and modifications before the prosthesis is created.

As you begin the prosthetic process, there are a few things to keep in mind that will hopefully help make your journey easier to navigate. Everyone heals and progresses at a different pace. Your prosthetist will work with you and your care team to ensure you are making strides to obtain your goals. Many amputees find it helpful to meet with a peer visitor (someone who has gone through amputation) to answer your questions based on their own experience. Your Lawall prosthetist can help you find a support group or peer visitor if you are interested.

RECEIVING YOUR PROSTHESIS

When you receive your final prosthesis, your prosthetist will provide you with a wear-in schedule, so you can gradually get accustomed to wearing it. He or she will also explain how to don and doff your device, plus give instructions for maintenance and care of your device.

During the first year, your residual limb will continue to change shape so you will need to have regular follow up appointments with your prosthetist for modifications and adjustments, in addition to follow up appointments with your physician. It is not uncommon to need a new socket or an entirely new prosthesis. Your prosthetist will continually be monitoring your limb, your activity level and overall goals throughout the process to ensure that you have the most appropriate componentry and best fitting socket to enable you to reach your fullest potential.

Expect to continue with physical therapy (for lower extremity amputations) or occupational therapy (for upper extremity amputations) with your prosthesis to receive additional training and exercise. Take advantage of the resources offered by connecting with a certified peer mentor and/or attending a support group event designed to provide the opportunity to meet and engage with others who have experienced limb loss.

As time passes, wearing a prosthesis and integrating it into your old patterns will become more routine for you. We know it will be challenging at times, but Lawall will be there to support you. Your hard work and dedication will pay off.
